Description of the Course

This seminar offers an introduction to the study of film and religion. We do not seek to understand how film and religion simply intersect in the medium of visual aesthetics, but how film could perform a religious worldview with distinct set of practices. This class, therefore, serves as a way to understand cinema as representing a religiosity in its own right, and a way of being in the world.

Objectives

The basic goals of the course are as follow:

- 1. To acquire basic themes in the relationship between cinematic experience and religiosity.
- 2. To foster an alternative understanding of religion as a distinct human practice.
- 3. Study of non-American cultures and histories.
- 4. To gain a familiarity with basic theoretical debates on religion, secularism and cinematic modernity.
- 5. To improve one's writing and critical skills, including creative writing.

Prerequisites

This is an upper-division religion course. You are required to have background in essay writing. No religion course prerequisites for this class.

Exams

<u>Midterm paper:</u> a 1000-word paper, answering one of the provided four questions. The paper will be due a week after the questions are handed out in class. Please note 1000 words is the maximum. Your paper should be analytical. You should provide a short bibliography at the end of your paper, number your pages and also create a thesis statement, articulated in the introduction of the paper. <u>Final Exam:</u> A 4000 to 5000-words screenplay due on <u>December 7</u>. Your screenplay is a creative exercise and it should be narrative (of any kind) that would involve "religion" as a theme. The pages should be numbered. Your screenplay is open to any historical or social settings, but religion has to be a main feature of the text. As for matter of presentation, it does not need to abide by any formal rules or writing format, although English standards such as grammar or spellings will apply. What I want you to do is to come up with a *cinematic story* that involves religion or a religious theme. Be creative. Be original. I will evaluate you based on creativity and also depth of understanding religion, whatever that maybe, through the cinematic writing. The films you will be watching, the lectures and

discussions should provide you with ideas and structure for your screenplay. religion101ucsd@gmail.com
